John West Recital—Review

udos to Pro Organo Ottawa for scheduling a delightful evening of relaxation and sheer fun, entitled Curiosities and Discoveries, with organist John West, at Rideau Park United Church, on March 28. Normally, I tend to "hole up" after Easter (five different services in the space of four days) and surface, somewhat punch-drunk, several days later, more interested in a good book than attending an organ recital. The scheduling of the immensely popular and multi-talented West for the March 28th concert ensured a good turnout, and the program of music by 11 composers had something for (almost) everyone. If there was any distress amongst the listeners over the absence of the 'regulation' prelude and fugue of JSB early in the program, it was not evident. The audience applauded with enthusiasm and really enjoyed West's engaging humour and anecdotes. A few of us may even have gleaned some bold new ideas on repertoire. The first half of the evening had an English flavour, with works by Walond, Hollins and Vaughan Williams, all given stylistically appropriate Jr.'s organist at Dexter Avenue Baptist. readings with great technical ease. A new work for me was a transcription of the "Lullaby" from Khachaturian's ballet Gayane, (which contains the well-known Sabre Dance), very haunting in its folkinspired modal harmonies and almost

'Asian' melodies. The Guilbault-Thérien 3-manual came into its own for Reger's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor, for which



West had a lovely registration. The first half ended with three pieces on Spiritual themes by fellow American organist Ralph Simpson, who was Dr. Martin Luther King From the "trio sonata" style for Jacob's Ladder to a "bluesy" Swing Low to a romping finale on Roll, Jordan, Roll, this music was very easy on the ear.

Music inspired by spirituals continued in the second half of the concert, this time thanks to the work of Nigerian composer Fela Sowande. John West seemed to delight in the seamless interface of jazz and JSB in Joshua Fit the Battle. Another 'discovery' for me was the organ music of Mexican composer José Jésus Estrada. The Procesion y Saeta is an unusual though very approachable tone poem, built on Andalusian themes. As an aside, I have discovered that this piece is available in "Mexican Composers for the Organ, Vol. 2", edited by James Welch. The program was rounded out with Vierne and Widor. Here. West was clearly in his element, and his exuberance came through, especially in his interpretation of the Finale from Widor's Symphonie II. However, given his program, I was sad that we could not hear him on a bigger instrument, with the tonal diversity to which he is clearly more accustomed. He worked hard to overcome the limitations of the instrument, but it was not suited to his repertoire.

West is clearly a departure from our regular breed of recitalists. It was refreshing to hear how enthusiastically he promotes his fellow American composers. If he returns to Ottawa, it might be worth assuring the presence of young people who would find out from him just how much fun it can be to play the organ!
